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Awards Kick Off Second Visitor Season for TFC

Two major statewide awards presented to the Tillamook Forest Center this spring raised the Center's profile as a major Oregon visitor attraction. The awards, given in the fields of Oregon heritage and tourism achievement, give visitors a good reason to come up to the forest to see what all the buzz is about. These awards highlight the high quality visitor experience at the Center and its effectiveness at connecting visitors with the natural landscape.

Oregon Tourism Achievement Award

In April, the Center received the Gene Leo Memorial Award for outstanding achievement and effort connecting the public with Oregon's natural resources, scenic beauty and outdoor recreation. The award was

one of six Oregon Tourism Achievement Awards presented by Travel Oregon and the Oregon Tourism Commission at the annual Governor's Conference on Tourism. The award honors Gene Leo, the enthusiastic and charismatic former director of the Oregon Zoo and Portland Rose Festival who died in 1994. Gene helped plant trees in

the Tillamook and loved to fish Tillamook State Forest rivers. Project Leader Doug Decker and Center Director Jim Quiring accepted the award on behalf of the wide team of people, past and present, who have contributed their time, expertise and energy to the project and the day-to-day operation of the Center. The award is on display at the Center.

Oregon Heritage Excellence Award

In early May, the Center received this new special award from the Oregon Heritage Commission, recognizing the successful planning and development of the Tillamook Forest Center as a place for forest history and heritage. The award, presented by Oregon First Lady Mary Oberst at the 2007 Oregon Heritage conference in Pendleton, was accepted by Doug Decker on behalf of the team that planned the TFC. This award is also on display at the Center.

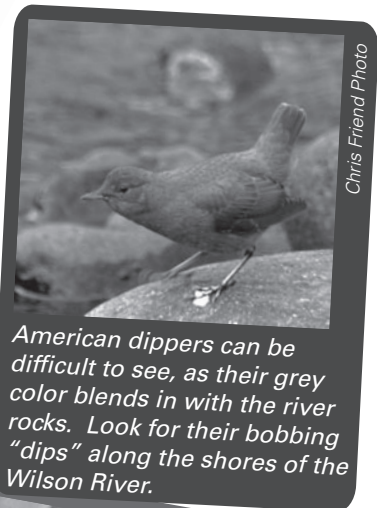

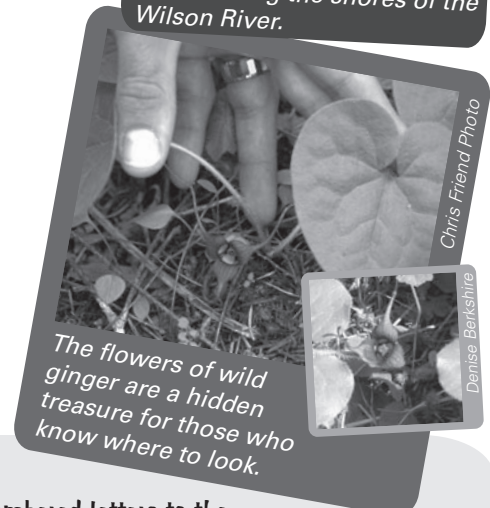

Summer Recreation — Ensuring Quality Forest Experiences for Everyone

Visitors experience forests on foot, horseback, mountain bike or off-highway vehicle. Oregon has many amazing natural and scenic areas. Of the 68.8 million visitors seeking out recreational activities each year on Oregon public lands, an estimated 30.8 million or 45% occur at forest related sites.*

As we enjoy our forests in increasing numbers, our recreation activities can have lasting effects on the surrounding forest environment. Litter, eroded soils, trampled vegetation, and carved or cut down trees are just a few of the challenges on the Tillamook State Forest. Forest visitors can improve the quality of everyone's experience by being considerate and respectful of

the environment and other people. Please keep the following "leave no trace" suggestions in mind to reduce impacts to the forest while recreating.

- Every forested area is unique. Know the regulations, special concerns and permit requirements for the forest you visit.
- Stay on designated trails and set up camp in established sites to reduce impacts.
- Avoid travel when environmental conditions, such as muddy trails, make recreation impacts more likely or severe. Avoid sensitive times and habitats.
- Pre-plan your meals to avoid leftovers that may attract animals. Package food in reusable containers or plastic bags and pack out any waste.
- Minimize campfire impacts. It is preferable to use a stove, but if you must have a campfire, use wood brought from home. Firewood smaller than the diameter of your wrist breaks easily and burns completely to ash. Never leave a campfire unattended and do not try to burn trash that would have to be removed later. During regulated use, fires are only allowed in designated camp sites. Check the regulations prior to your camping trip.
- Observe wildlife from a distance to avoid startling them or forcing them to flee. Never feed animals. If you travel with your pet, always carry a leash for control. Pets must be on a leash in campgrounds and day use areas, at trailheads and at the Tillamook Forest Center.

While enjoying your Tillamook Forest this summer please help ensure quality recreation experiences for everyone by respecting the forest.

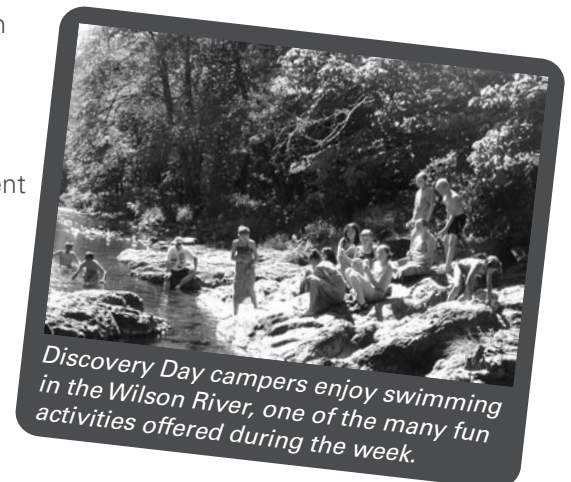

Tillamook State Forest Discovery Day Camp

Do you have a child between the ages of 9 and 11 looking for an exciting week in the forest this summer? Join experienced educators, foresters, and recreation leaders for a week of discovery and fun in the Tillamook State Forest! Campers will explore the forest, search for wildlife and participate in hands-on learning and recreation activities while learning how to do each safely and responsibly. Throughout the week they will be introduced to forest ecology, history and current management, closing with an overnight camp out at Jones Creek Campground where campers practice leave no trace ethics and go on a night hike.

This year, two camp sessions are being offered. Session #1 runs July 23-27 and meets at the Forest Grove Oregon Department of Forestry (ODF) district office. Session #2 runs August 6-10 and meets at the Tillamook ODF district office. Registration must be received before **July 6th for session #1** and **July 20th for session #2**. Transportation is provided from the district offices to the Tillamook Forest Center. One special program was held March 3rd. ODF employees and TFC volunteers, Deb 'Cookie' Smith, Lynette 'Bloomers' Rothwell, and Sandy 'Firefly' Creson, shared the stories of mountain women who might have lived and worked in the coastal mountains now known as the Tillamook State Forest. As many as 80 visitors heard stories and learned lessons about life in the early pioneer era of these mountains and, in the process, also learned about the

special values of the Tillamook State Forest. "Cookie," "Bloomers" and "Firefly" demonstrated Dutch oven cooking (and gave free samples!), shared examples of clothing, demonstrated the use of tools, and displayed clothing worn in this period of our history. Visitors were thrilled to take part in this program.

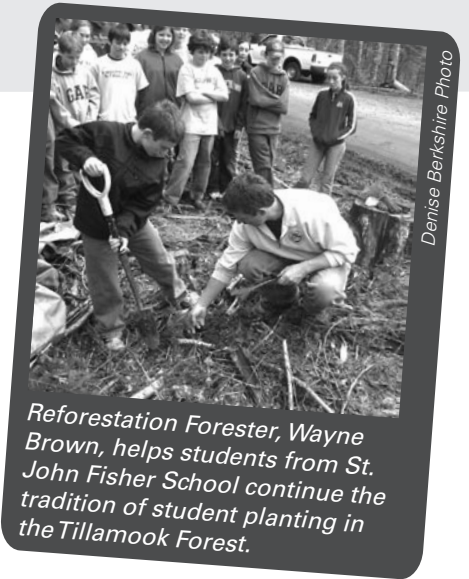

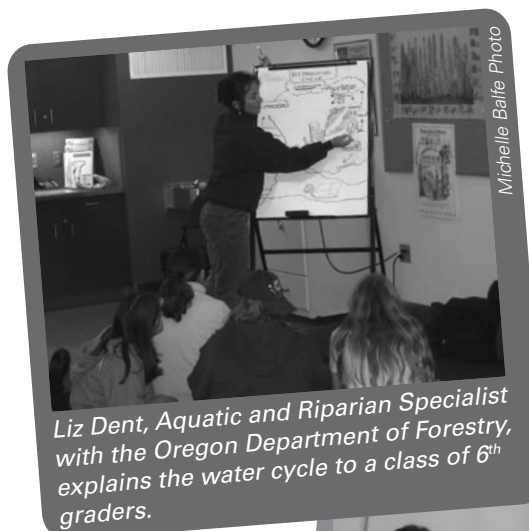

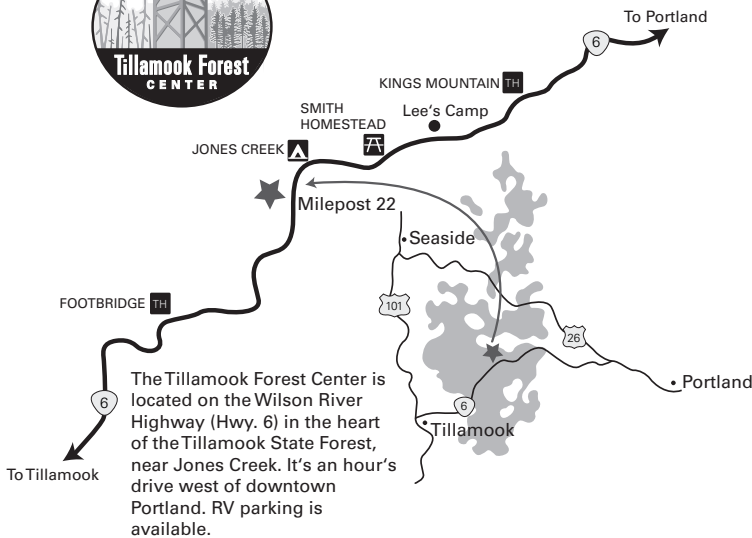
