


Naturalist Notes


2/25: Large splatters of whitewash and several bone-filled pellets under the lookout tower lead

Leave No Trace program focuses on Tillamook State Forest

With increasing numbers of visitors finding fun in the Tillamook State Forest, we are seeing a rise in resource damage, sanitation problems, litter and overcrowding in some of the areas of concentrated recreational use.

We recently received great news that could help with some of the recreation use challenges occurring on the forest. The Tillamook State Forest was selected as one of 12 Hot Spots nationwide by the national Leave No Trace Center for Outdoor Ethics. Specifically, the Highway 6 corridor was chosen as the focus of the Hot Spot. The Leave No Trace program teaches people how to enjoy the outdoors responsibly.



A special summer display at the center helps to illustrate Leave No Trace ethics and give visitors a chance to identify what's wrong with this campsite.



Practicing Leave No Trace ethics not only reduces impacts on the environment, but also keeps the forest clean, safe and fun for the future.

One of the benefits of the Hot Spot designation is that we will host a week-long visit from one of the expert Subaru/Leave No Trace Traveling Trainer teams. This will occur from June 1 - June 8.

As summarized on the Leave No Trace web site, the 2015 Hot Spots will receive:

- Consultation on solutions and program implementation from the Leave No Trace Center;
- Training workshops for volunteers, employees and key members of the community;
- Locally-tailored programs to meet site-specific needs;
- Educational materials;
- Volunteer citizen monitoring programs; and
- Assistance in putting the Leave No Trace program into action.

By identifying and working with Hot Spots across the nation, we rapidly move toward recovering and protecting the places we cherish for future generations.

All proceeds from the gift shop directly support the Tillamook Forest Center's programs and facilities.








