A gate to celebrate



The TFC's scenic suspension bridge over the Wilson River is a favorite of visitors, and the gate is also something to celebrate. To commemorate the 50th year anniversary of Oregon's Percent for Art in Public Places Program, the <code>bridge gate</code>, was selected as one of fifty publicly accessible works of art showcased in this year's $50 \over 60 \ \text{campaign}$. Created by Eric Robertson, the functional gate represents a new tree growing from a nurse log, which is a fallen decaying stump providing nutrients for the new growth.
