Recharging Rain Flows Through the Forest



When rain returns, many of us in the Northwest find ourselves cozying up with our favorite things. Maybe rain means brewing your favorite tea, getting out that fluffy blanket you miss during summer heat, or preparing a hearty soup. The rain flow of fall offers a chance to slow down and recharge.

When the rains return to the Tillamook Forest Center, the trails, the Wilson River, and even our programs are recharged. The river's flow and water level increases. The river gets louder, and energizing rushing water signals that logs, rocks, and sediments are moving downstream. The water is flushing, cleaning, and recharging the watershed. On trails, moss that was crunchy from summer heat becomes lush and carpets the forest floor. Our programs become focused on all that the flow of fall brings to the forest

You're invited to visit the Tillamook Forest Center this fall and experience the magic of the handplanted temperate rainforest. Walk the trails during a downpour to hear the water flow recharging the forest as raindrops *tap tap tap on* leaves and the hood of your rain jacket. And when you're soaked to the core, the warm visitor center with indoor programs offers shelter to relax, recharge, and explore.

Thank you, Laura, for your dedicated service, empathetic and mindful approach, holistic and strategic thinking, and strong leadership. We wish you the best!


Upcoming Programs and Events

Exciting New Partnership to Expand the Wilson River Trail

The State Forests Trust of Oregon is excited to announce a new partnership with <u>Trailkeepers of Oregon</u> (TKO) to build a five-mile extension of the Wilson River Trail. The Trust invested \$40,000 of the \$75,000 needed to extend the trail from Idiot Creek Loop Road to Drift Creek Trailhead. This new section will provide non-motorized trail users with stunning creek and forest vistas. There are several places to access the Wilson River Trail including the Tillamook Forest Center where you can pick up a <u>trail quide</u> to plan your hike.

TKO will host volunteer trail party events, consisting of 6-12 participants. Visit TKO for information about volunteer opportunities You can also make a gift to the Trust's Recreation Fund. Together, we can make this dream a reality.
